

Sample written rationale for a restrictive intervention

This is an example of a written rationale – any rationale should contain as a minimum the information in the document below. Training providers and commissioning organisations may have their own format for this

The written rationale for teaching the restrictive intervention should be completed by the named person in the training provider organisation after all the personalised wellbeing risk assessment information has been gathered and the personalised wellbeing risk assessment has been completed.

The written rationale for the use of each restrictive intervention should be authorised by both the named person in the commissioning organisation and the named person in the training provider organisation.
